Indigo Science - How much carbon dioxide is in fizzy drinks?

Did you know that fizzy drinks have been in existence since the late 18th century, when Dr Joseph Priestley discovered a means of artificially carbonating water.

Indigo enjoyed comparing the amount of carbon dioxide in fizzy drinks. They weighed them, shook them for a minute to make them flat and re-weighed them. Indigo had varying results but generally, coca cola had the most carbon dioxide as it contained the most sugar. We also enjoyed seeing the carbon dioxide visually with balloons!

Blue Class Science Blue Class enjoyed investigating a variety of materials using a reflection tester made from a torch and white card. They found that the most reflective materials were shiny, smooth and bright. Blue then designed their own reflective bag so that drivers could see the book bag easily when their car headlights shine on it. We also talked about Percy Shaw and his invention of cat's eyes.








UV Science - Shadows UV enjoyed investigating how to make the biggest shadow possible from their puppets. They kept the torch 30cm away from the shadow puppet to make it fair and only changed the distance from the screen in 5cm intervals up to 25cm. UV concluded that as the puppet was moved further from the screen, the shadow got bigger – well done!

They also performed a short scene involving the scientists Newton and Hooke. Isaac Newton made many important discoveries about light. However, one of his contemporaries, Robert Hooke, did not agree with his ideas so they became enemies and rivals.













NEWS FROM 'THE POT OF GOLD'



Having recently stepped back from my role as SENCo at Unicorn School, I'm now able to focus on my position as a specialist learning support teacher. 
